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NRC FINDS PERFORMANCE 'ACCEPTABLE' AT KEWAUNEE NUCLEAR PLANT IN LATEST REVIEW

The Nuclear Regulatory Commission staff has found that safety performance remains acceptable in the NRC's latest plant performance review at the Kewaunee Nuclear Power Station, located at Kewaunee, Wisconsin.

The review covered the time period from February 1997 through January 31.

In a letter to Wisconsin Public Service Corporation, which operates the plant, Geoffrey Grant, Division Director in the NRC's Region III Office, said, "Overall, performance at Kewaunee during this assessment period was acceptable."

"Performance was generally characterized by effective management involvement and coordination, efficient maintenance work planning and completion, and teamwork between licensee organizations to ensure routine activities are successfully accomplished," he continued.

Grant also added, "However, some decline in operational performance from the previous assessment period was noted. While operational events have continued to be few in number, deficient operational practices have begun to result in events of more safety significance at Kewaunee."

NRC reviews safety performance twice a year at every licensed nuclear power plant in the nation. These reviews give the agency staff an integrated assessment of plant performance and provide a basis for planning inspection activities.

Plant performance reviews are an interim measure NRC is using to monitor nuclear power plant safety. The agency began using it for this purpose after suspending the Systematic Assessment of License Performance (SALP) process until a new assessment program is developed. Previously, SALP reports were issued every 12 to 24 months.

The new reactor oversight and assessment program being developed will provide quarterly performance reports, based on a number of performance indicators and on inspection findings. This program will be tested at eight sites beginning in June and will be extended to all plants next January.
